From The Rector

Dear Friends,

From The Associate Rector

Dear Friends,

While I enjoy reading, since seminary, I haven't taken much time to read; consequentially, my reading list remains long. Near the top of that list, though, is a book by Julia Gatta, *The Nearness of God*; in it, she talks about parish ministry as a spiritual practice. One of the things she puts forward is that throughout our life, there will be aspects of our faith in which we are drawn to Christ, and other aspects through which Christ is forming us. Although the principle is oriented toward parish priests, I think it can apply to all Christians and their lives of faith.



The summer when I first encountered this idea, I immediately was able to name what area of my vocation through which I feel that I am being formed by Christ; I knew immediately because being formed is often not an easy or comfortable process. What immediately came to mind was one of five that Gatta names: *outreach*. Being a downtown parish in a small town, we are uniquely positioned when it comes to outreach.

As outreach is not something that comes naturally to me, it makes sense that this is the area in which I feel that I am being formed. Honestly, outreach is a struggle for me, it will never come second nature to me the way it does other people. I knew this was where Christ was (and is) forming me even before our Cloister Community started to grow. Part of our call as Christians is to serve others, often outside of our parish walls, but I'm so much more comfortable inside them.

Formation isn't easy; to be molded and shaped by Christ to become who we ought to become will not be easy if undertaken seriously. I know that I am being shaped and formed as we continue to journey with our Cloister Community and look for a path forward. For me, and maybe for you, too, this isn't an easy process; I have lots of questions and there a lot of unknowns at this early stage. This is why I have taken to praying the prayer that the Sacred Conversations group has created as we continue to work toward a sustainable solution.

Almighty and most merciful God, we ask for your help as we live into our baptismal covenant; we pray for the ways in which we can seek and serve Christ in all persons and respect the dignity of every human being, especially as we journey with the members of our Cloister Community. Living Waters for the World Mission Trip Report

We have been learning and talking about Living Waters for the World now for over two years. We know that it has over 900 water filtration systems in 25 countries. We know that the systems are sustainable and built to last for two generations. We know that the system is composed of filters and UV lights that are designed to remove debris and undissolved solids and bacteria to purify the water for safe consumption. What we have not focused on in our educational journey is that it is as much of a relationship building tool as anything.

On our recent trip to Peru, we had 12 people from the three surrounding communities attend the education classes. These were not just local town folk who were curious to see what all the fuss was about. The class was composed of men and women who are leaders in their communities: health promoters, principals and teachers all of whom see how having clean water will impact their respective communities. All of whom care enough to learn to be equipped with the tools to teach the communities long after we are gone. Though everything was translated from one language to another, the language barrier did not stop the message from being conveyed: all of God's children are deserving of having clean, pure, agua viva (living water).

As for the installation, the Peruvian men worked overtime to ready the space for the system taking pride in every detail from purging the concrete floor to painting the walls white to reflect the heat of the sun (we were 3.5 degrees from the equator!). The first morning, Segundo, the jack of all trades on the boat crew, got up before the sunrise to cut wooden boards, plane them, and build a frame in which he would eventually cut out two holes for sinks. All before we got out of bed! And we got up early! The cooks took pride and care in our meals providing us with freshly squeezed pasteurized juices, French toast, eggs, fish, fresh fruit, and other provisions making sure we had the best and cleanest food they could provide in order to give us strength to accomplish our tasks of the day.

Every last person on the CEC LWW team pushed his/her limits running through the airport as to not miss a flight, brushing their teeth with bottled water, putting ideas together to come up with the absolute best solutions possible, all egos aside. Getting up earlier than usual to get the most out of every day. Problem solving, interpreting a translated language, communicating with gestures, showering in uncomfortable surroundings, sleeping in mosquito nets. Pushing all the boundaries of the creature comforts that could have so easily been chosen over this challenge.

On the day of the dedication service people started showing up on foot and by the boat load. Boats from both directions of the river started to collect at the river bank. People from the three surrounding communities and wider started gathering. There were over 175 people that showed up that day! It was then that I realized how much bigger this project was than I or my group or even Christ Church. For the people of Commandancia, Nuevo Israel, Santo Tomas, this represented hope. Hope of a better life for their children, hope of a better life for the elderly in the community, hope for the future. On the first day that we arrived down river, we had no cell service, no wi-fi, no electricity, but my cell phone dinged with a notification. It was my Spanish dictionary giving me my "word of the day." The word of the day was "esperanza" which was defined as "hope, anticipation, expectation, confidence." What was so special about this was that Esperanza was also the name of the boat that had carried us down river! It had also carried 300 five-gallon water bottles for distribution, water tanks, education materials, eye glasses, soap, vitamins, medical supplies, PVC pipes for the system, the UV light, the filters, etc. But in that moment it occurred to me that it was actually "hope" that we were delivering.

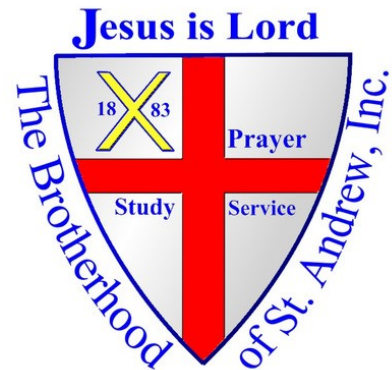
The Daughters will gather to stuff goody bags for the Episcopal Campus Ministry students' final exams followed by dinner and a regular meeting.

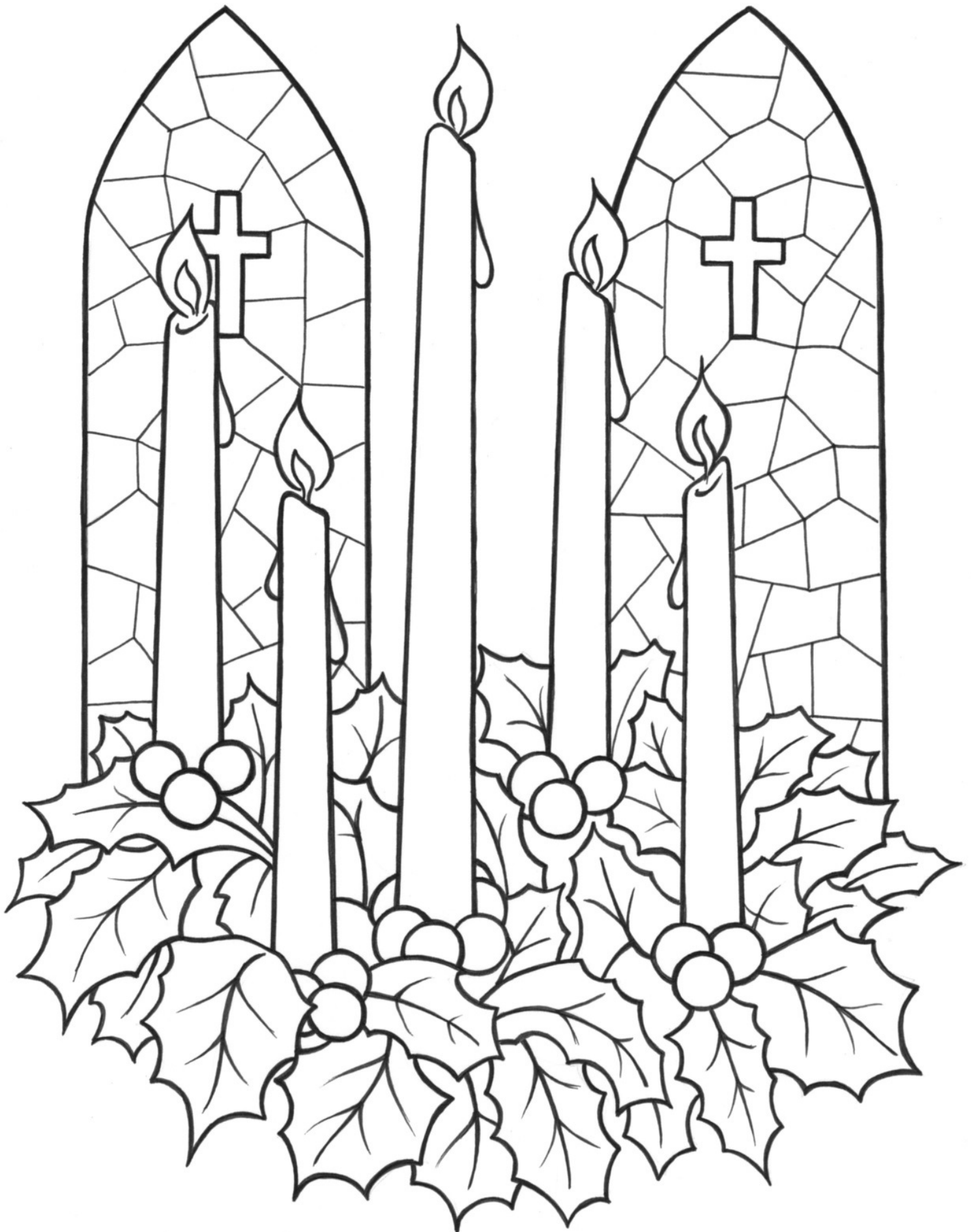


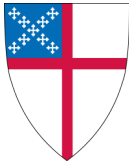
Father Steve is a born teacher! Here he is explaining the future of Prayer Book revision at the Diocesan Convention.
